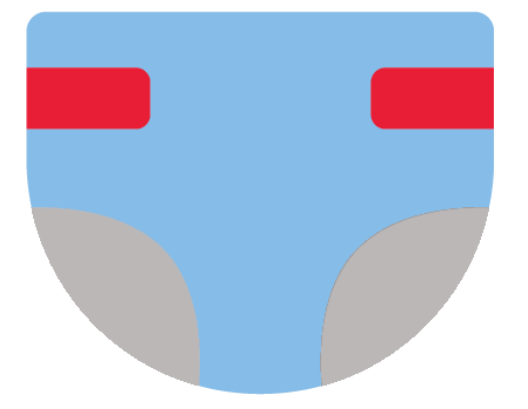


Washington Diaper Facts

Diapers are a basic need of all babies, essential to their health and well being. Keeping infants and toddlers clean, dry, and healthy helps build the strong foundation all children require to reach their full potential. However, 1 in 2 U.S. families with young children struggles to afford clean diapers for their baby.*

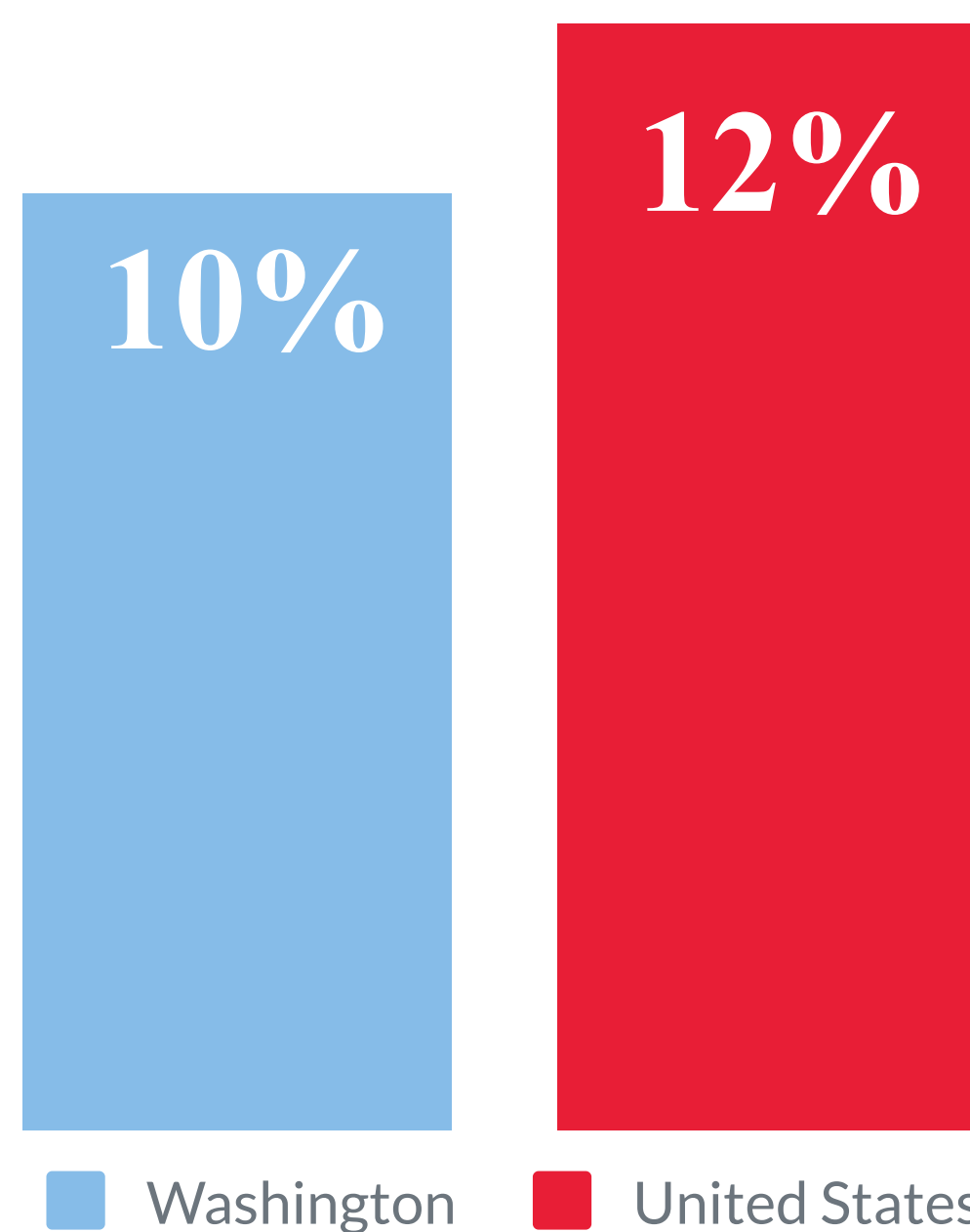

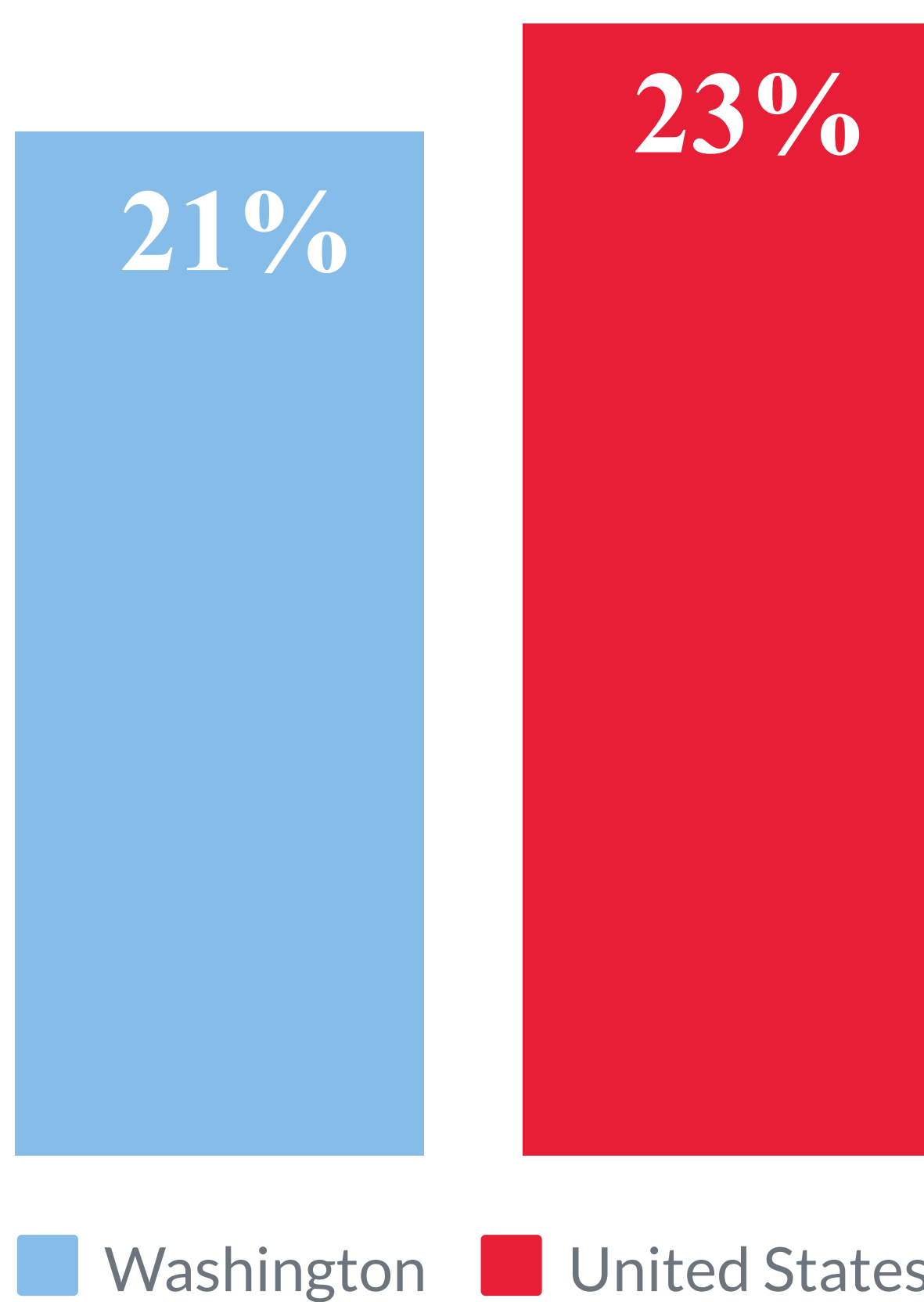
Washington's Babies Need Strong Foundations

Children living in poor and low-income families are at greatest risk of suffering the effects of diaper need because many families can't afford diapers. Currently, government investment in nutrition programs for young children help some, but no such investment is made to provide diapers and other basic needs required to build a strong foundation for healthy growth that enables children to reach their full potential.

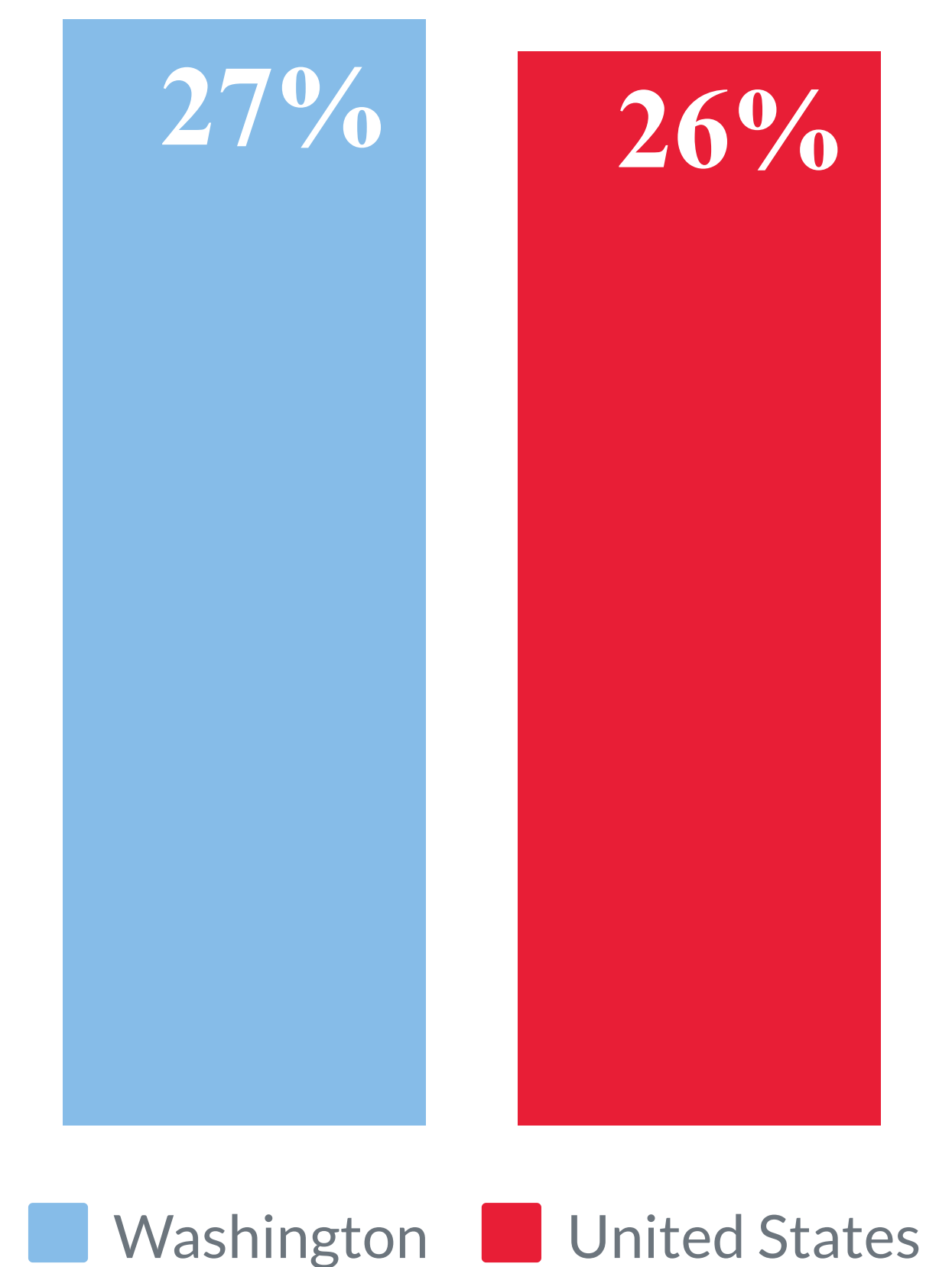
Percentage of SNAP Recipients Under Age 5



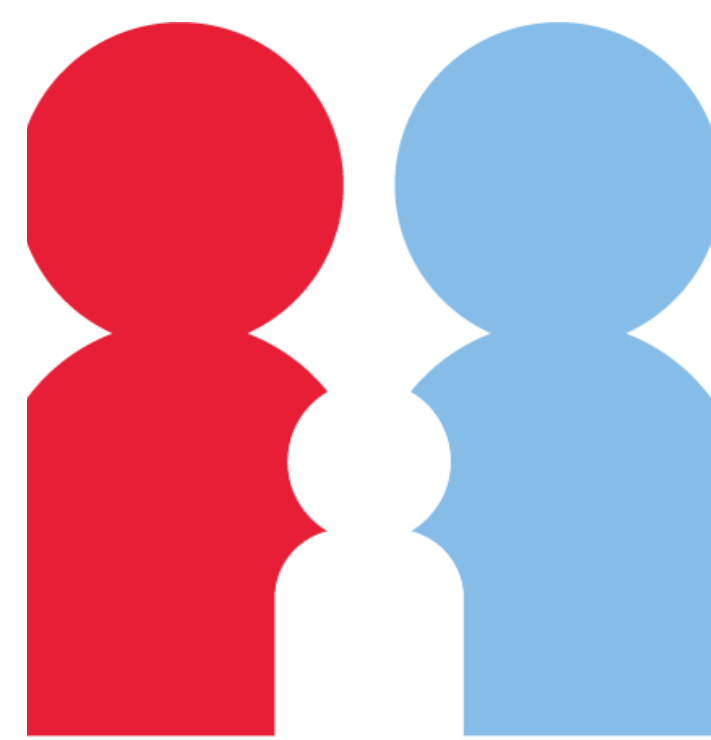
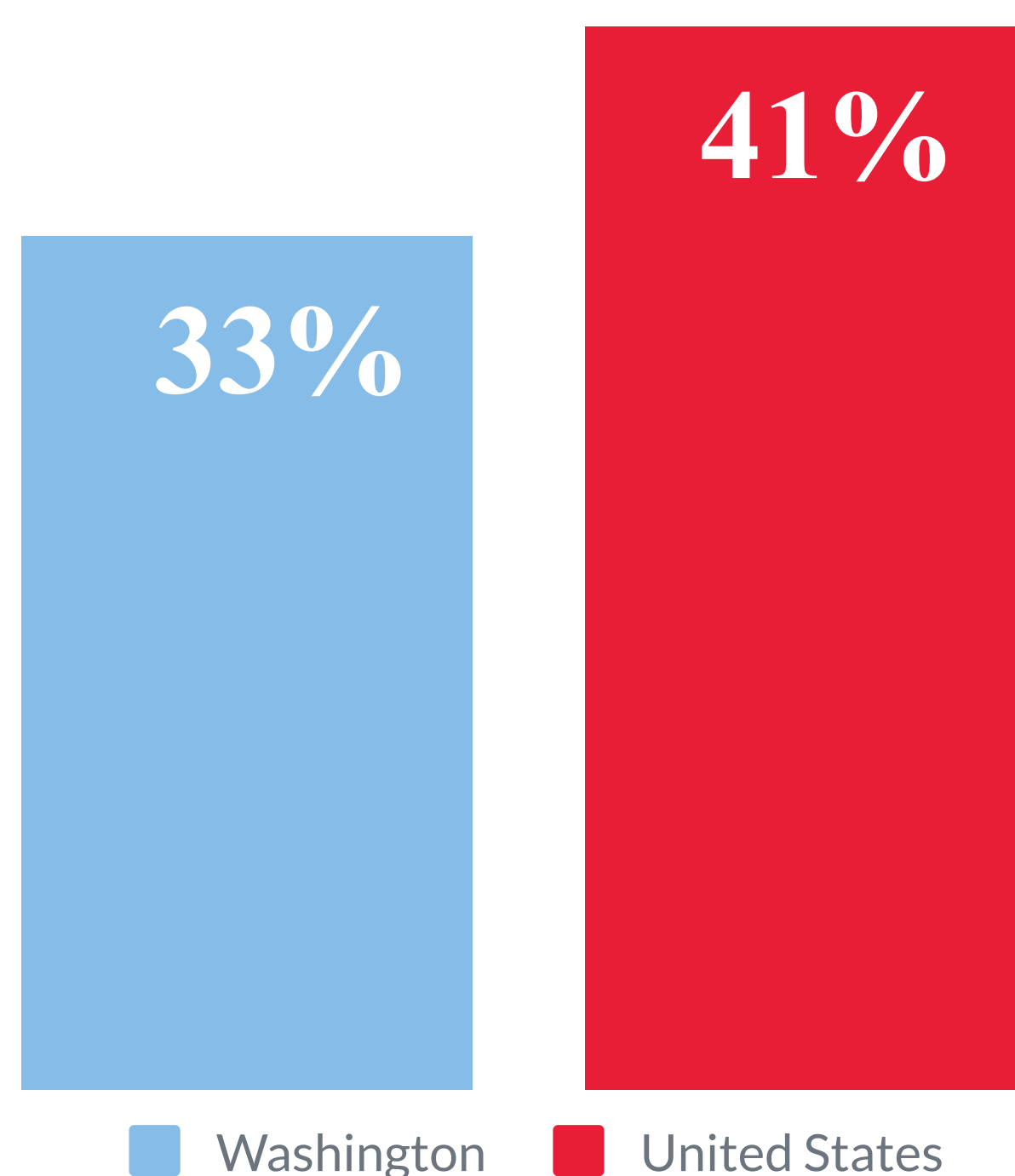
Percentage of WIC Recipients that Are Infants



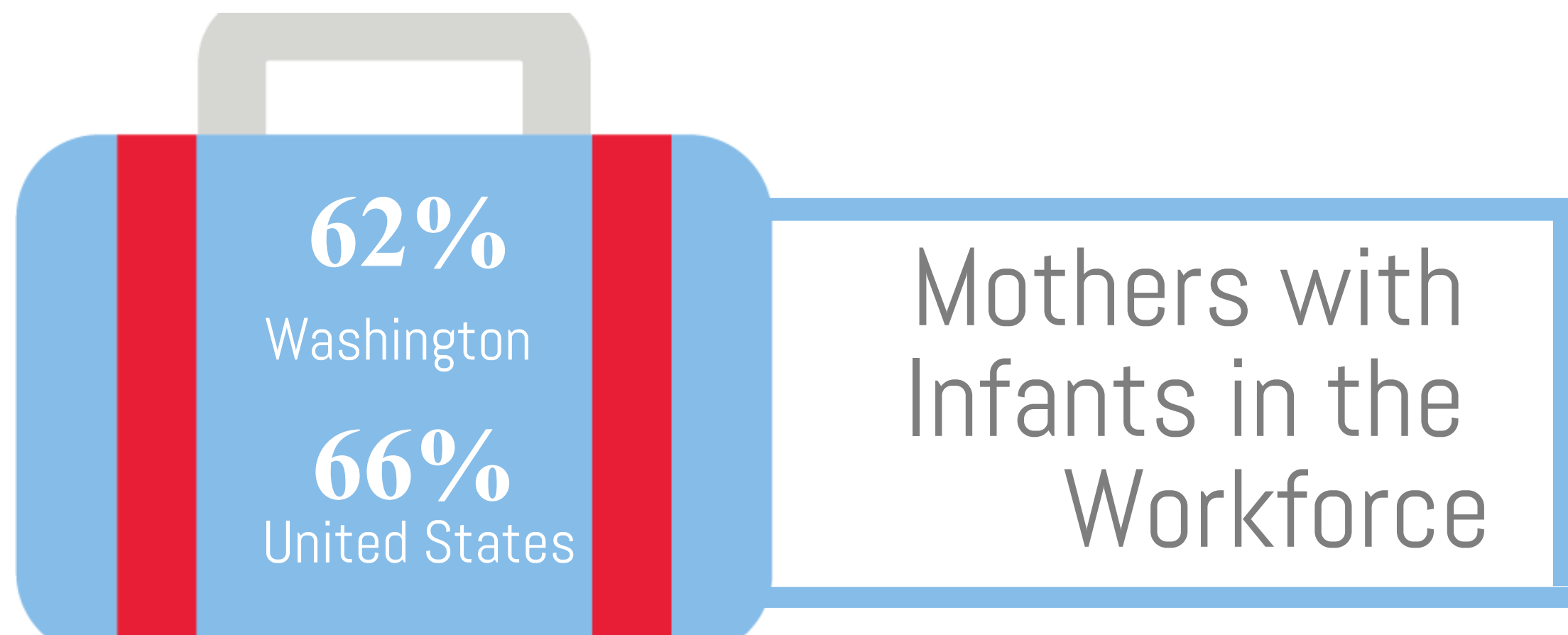
Percentage of TANF Families with at Least One Child Under Age 3



Percentage of Births Covered by Medicaid

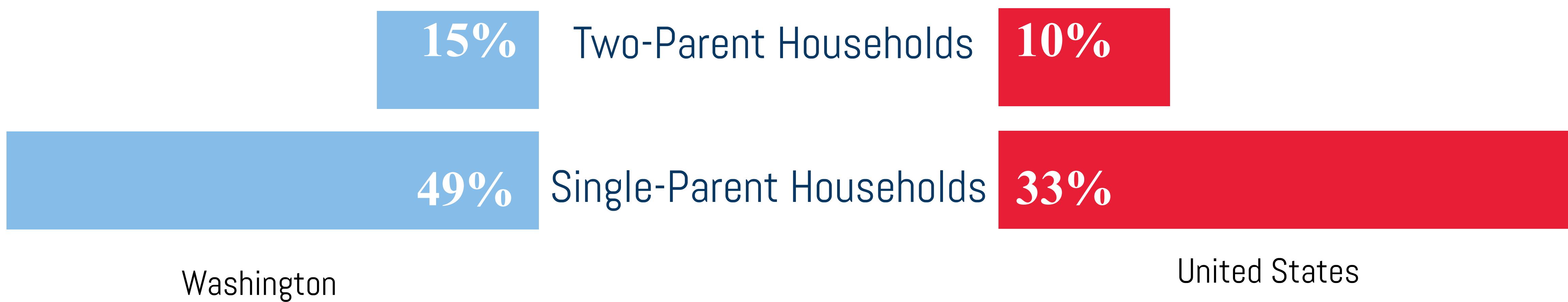


Diapers Are Essential to the Well-Being of Washington's Families



Most child care facilities require parents to provide diapers for their child. Nationally, 25% of parents with diaper need reported that they have missed an average of five days of work or school in the past month due to not having enough diapers to drop children off at child care.*

Cost of Infant Care as a Percentage of Income

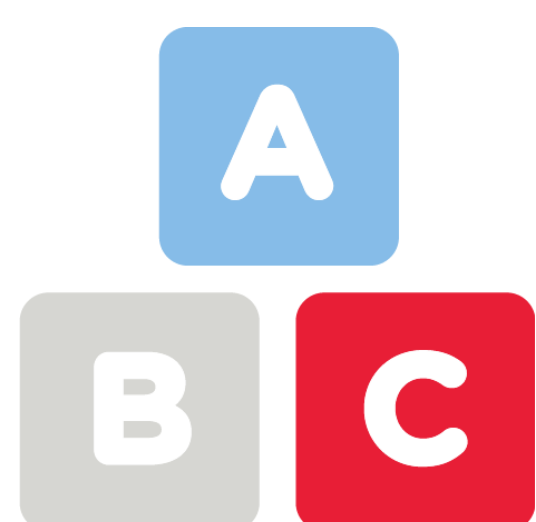


Early Education Programs Help Washington's Children

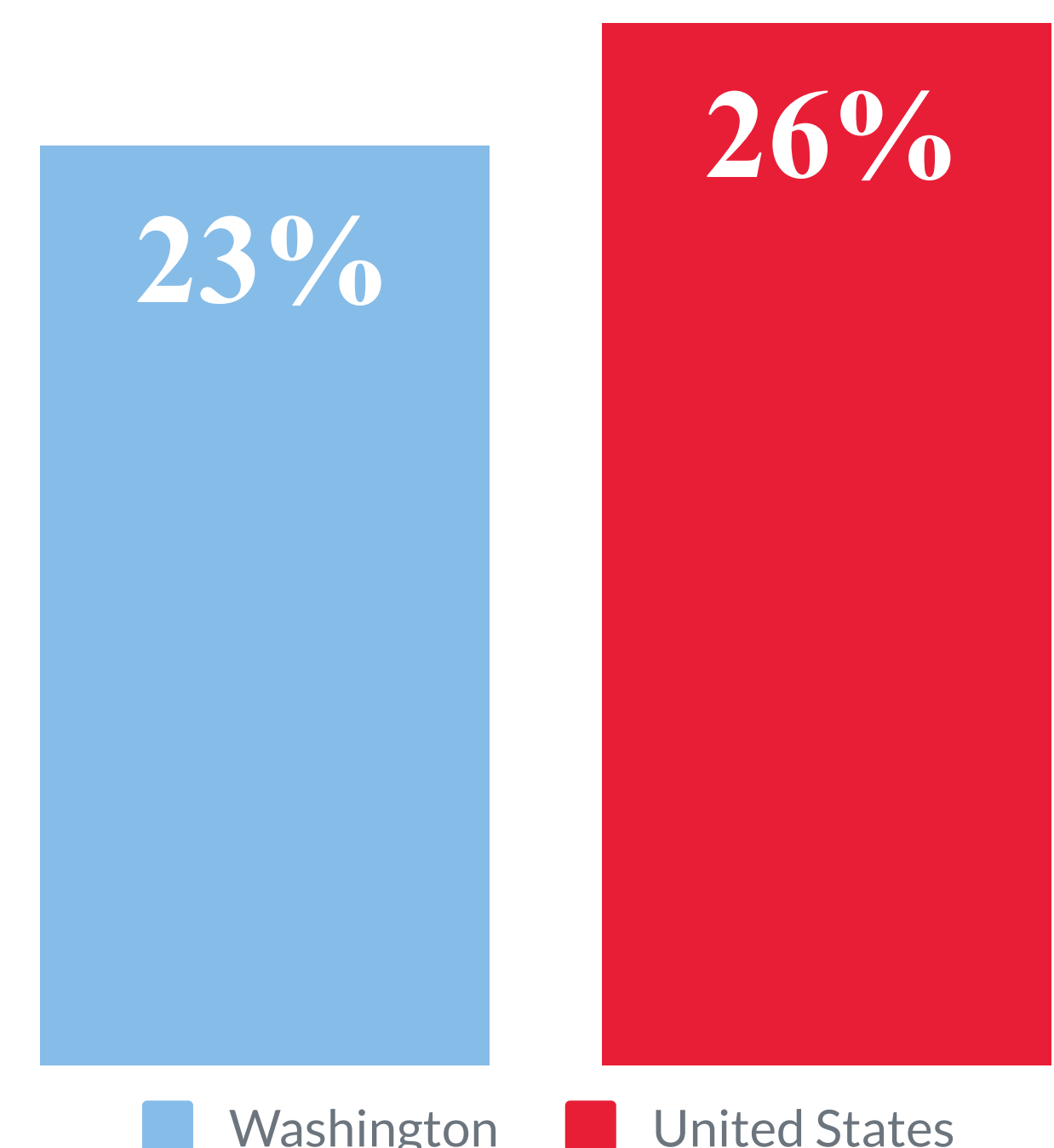
Early Head Start (EHS) provides child and family development services for infants, toddlers, and pregnant women. Center-based EHS programs provide diapers for infants and toddlers. Other federally funded child care assistance programs don't. For families enrolled in the latter, not having access to diapers removes a key building block for strong families. Without diapers a parent cannot go to work, and not working disqualifies a parent from vital child care resources.

Nationwide, **187,995** infants, toddlers, and mothers participate in Early Head Start.

3,516 are from Washington.

TANF & Diapers in Washington

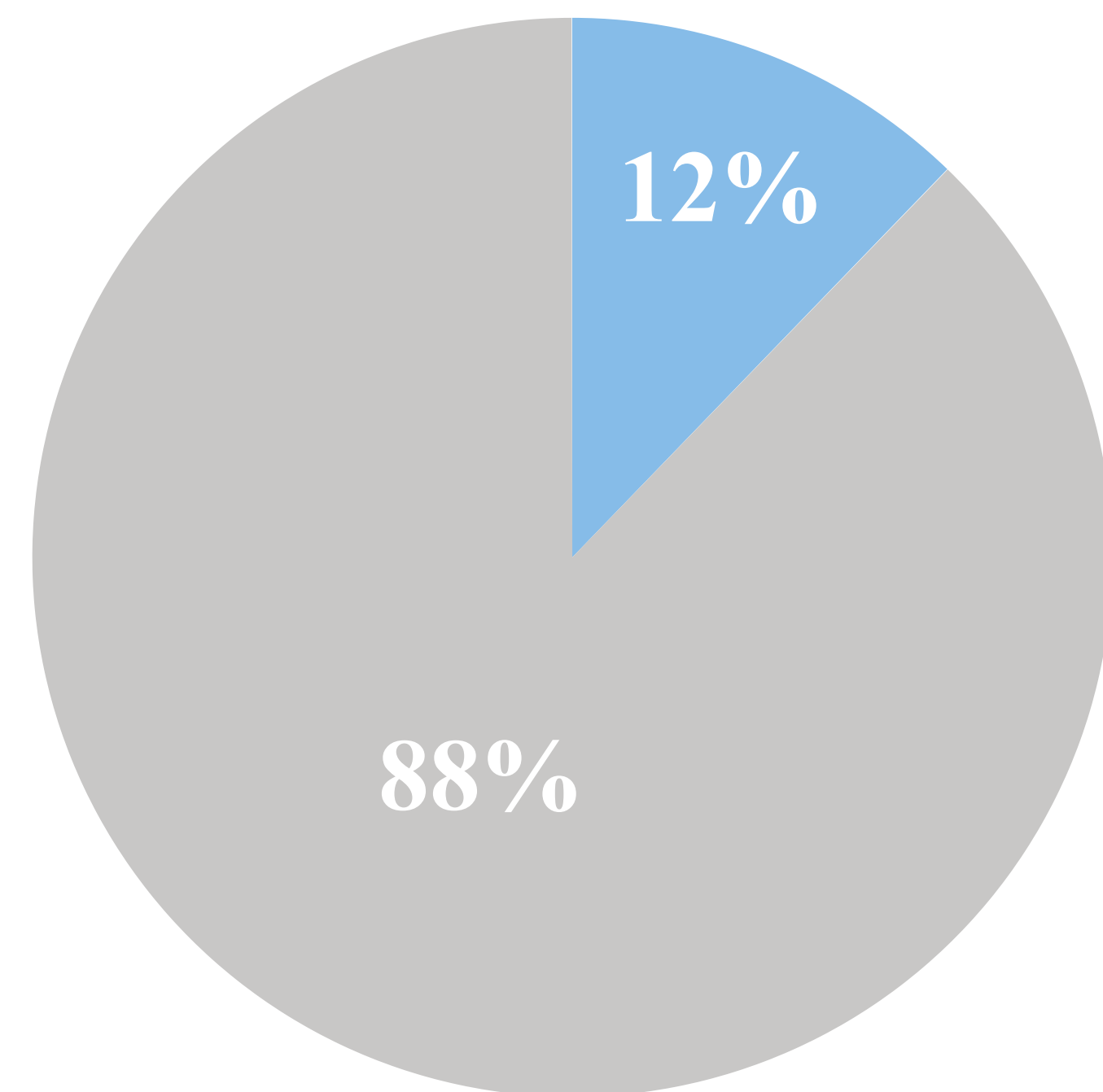
An average monthly supply of diapers costs \$80 to more than \$100. The only federal assistance program that can be used for diapers is TANF, but TANF has to cover many other expenses, including heat, electric and water bills, rent, clothing, transportation, and other basic needs. Little if any money is available to purchase enough diapers to keep a baby clean, dry, and healthy.

Washington Median State Level Benefit

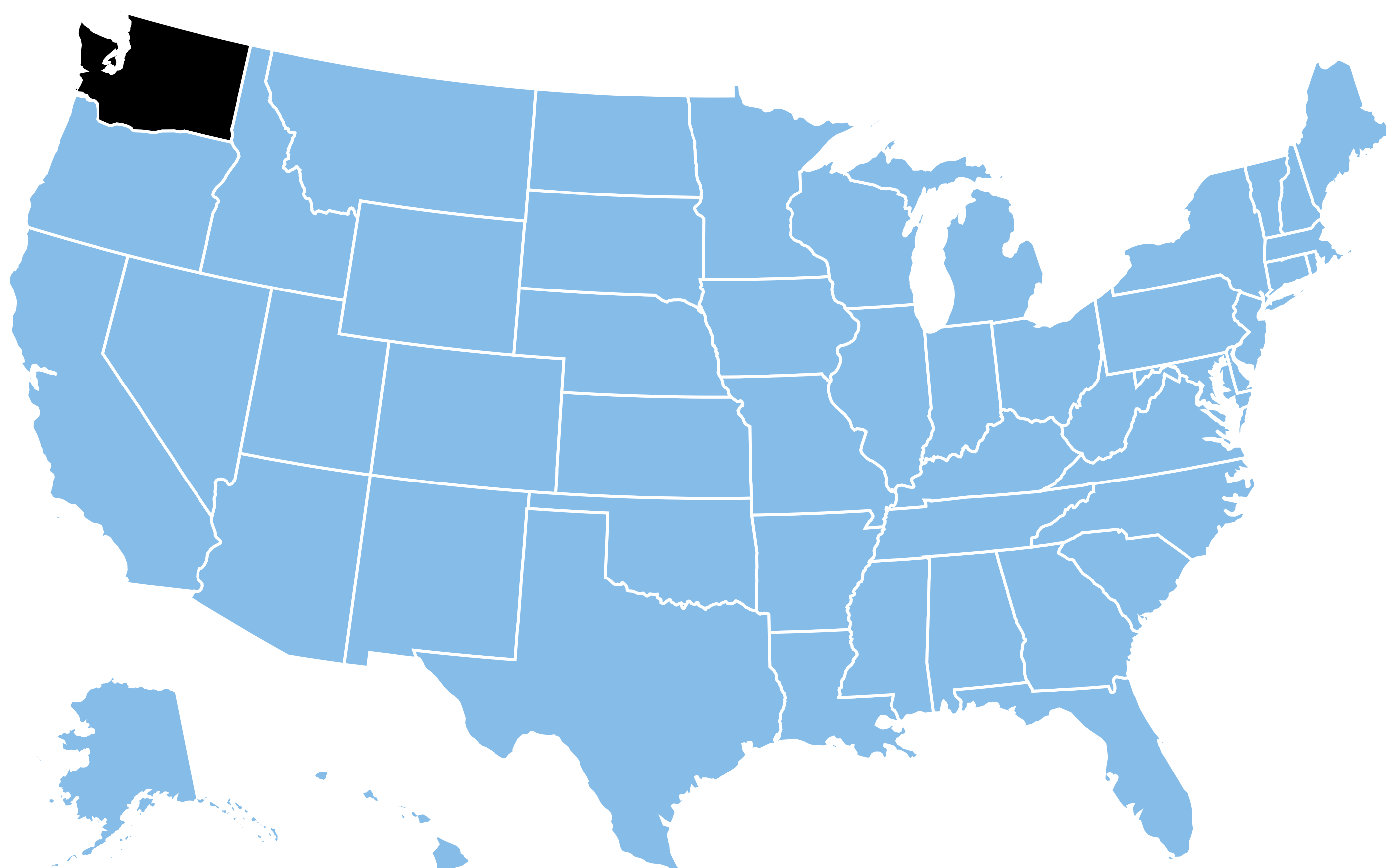
Diaper Costs Compared to Benefit

In Washington, there is a 24-month exemption from the work-related activity requirement after the birth of a child for single parent households receiving TANF payments.

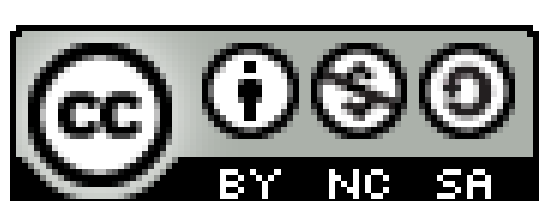
